

# Fresh Faces


Introducing Bryan Hansen, Mountain View Co-op's New CFO

He has been a controller for a number of companies for the past seven years, but most of that time was with Valley Wide Cooperative, where Bryan managed the accounting team for that \$500M+ local co-op. As such, Bryan is very familiar with the cooperative business model, the nuances of our business units, and all the accounting software systems we operate, which helped him get up to speed at Mountain View quickly.

In his "spare time", Bryan has taught courses in financial accounting and management accounting at several area Idaho colleges. He has his B.S. in Accounting and his Master of Accountancy degree. Bryan is also a Certified Public Accountant and Certified Management Accountant.

**Great, but what does a chief financial officer do?** According to the financial website investopedia.com, a CFO is responsible for managing the financial actions of a company, and they have seven key tasks:

- 1. Financial Planning and Strategizing
- 2. Reporting and Analysis
- 3. Managing Risk
- 4. Capital Management
- 5. Ensure Compliance With Regulations
- 6. Patron Relations
- 7. Assist With Strategic Decision-Making

We sat down and chatted with Bryan to see if we described his job correctly, and to talk about all things financial.

## Seven Questions With Bryan Hansen

#### Okay, What does a CFO do? Did investopedia.com get it right?

Pretty much. In a nutshell, I deal with all of the financial aspects of the co-op all the way from monitoring and managing our day-to-day transactions and positions to helping the team with future financial planning.

#### Does that mean you literally have control over all of Mountain View's money?

Well, I'm part of the team that does, but it's not just me. There's a strong system of checks and balances that makes sure that everything is on the up-and-up. It's really a shared responsibility among the entire executive team, our accounting group, and our board of directors.

#### How do you become a CFO?

You have to start with a love of numbers. I've always enjoyed working with numbers and money, so I got my Bachelor's Degree in Accounting and then my Master of Accountancy degree. My first job out of college was doing business taxes for an accounting firm in Spokane. I learned so much about the financial field, and about people in general, at that job. Over the years I climbed the ladder, and eventually became the controller for Valley Wide Cooperative, which is a \$500+ million dollar co-op in Idaho. That experience led me to this opportunity with Mountain View.

#### We're glad it did! What does your typical workday look like?

There really isn't a "typical day". There are some things that I do daily, like check all of our accounts, and check in with my team to see if there's anything they need, but otherwise each day is different. Sometimes the hardest part is correctly setting your priorities and making sure they get done. One day I might be in meetings all day, the next I might be interviewing potential employees, or I could be helping with an inventory issue, or running the numbers on a potential acquisition. It never gets boring!

#### The myth is that finance people are control freaks. Is this true?


Probably, haha. After all, finance people have a huge responsibility to not only our bosses in the co-op, but to all of our patrons who trust the co-op to do the right thing. A co-op is more than just a regular business, it's a promise we make to all of our patrons every day that we're going to do right by them. I suppose that responsibility makes us "control freaks" on some level, but our hearts are in the right place!

#### What's the number one quality a good CFO should have?

Integrity. Like I said, this position is a huge responsibility, and if you're not 100% ethical at all times you shouldn't ever be in this position. Another good quality is to have an open mind. It's easy to just say no to every new project or idea that comes at you, but you always have to do what's best for your company, even if it means more work for you and your team.

#### What would you tell a young person thinking about going into finance?

If they enjoy working with numbers, I would encourage them to do it. It's a great career path with opportunities across all industries. I would also suggest that they try to keep a good work and life balance. It's easy to become overwhelmed, especially during the busy times of the year, like End of Month or End of Year, but you can't forget to take care of yourself and your family. Always do good work, but remember why you work. If you do that, you'll be successful at work and in life.



Fertilize: Choose a balanced fertilizer and apply it at least in the spring and fall.

Overseeding: Overseed thin or patchy areas with a quality grass seed to fill in the gaps.

Mow it right: Follow the 1/3 rule: Never cut off more than 1/3 of the grass blade length at a time.

Water it properly: Water deeply a couple of times a week to promote drought tolerance and deep roots.

**Watch for diseases and pests:** Keep an eye on your lawn, and take care of problems before they escalate!

Let it breathe: Core aerating annually will improve water and air penetration and promote root development.

**Dethatch:** Don't let old grass clippings or leaves choke your lawn. Dethatching improves water and nutrient uptake.

**Control those weeds:** Regularly check your lawn for weeds and apply a herbicide when required. Don't let them spread!

# Mountain View Co-op Foundation Awards Eight More Grants

As a Montana cooperative, we believe it is **our duty and our privilege** to give back to our local communities. That's why we created the Mountain View Co-op Foundation. We're committed to supporting and strengthening our local communities through charitable donations and scholarships.

Our MVC Foundation met in late February and awarded grants to eight very worthy teams and projects.



The Cutting Fences Foundation is a nonprofit organization that serves Montana's farmers, ranchers, and veterans who are living with a disability or illness. They supply agriculture specific adapitve equipment like the Action Trackchair that is pictured above. This equipment allows folks to go places a normal wheelchair could never go, and helps them to maintain their independence and sense of agency. **We granted their request for \$5,000 to help buy a wheelchair accessable side-by-side.** 



Montana's rural communities simply don't have the budget to operate a full-time fire department, so residents step up and volunteer to protect their neighbor's lives and property.

There's no better example of this than the folks in Hogeland, Montana. Hogeland sits about 12 miles from the Canadian border and is roughly 180 miles northeast of Great Falls. **We donated \$7,000 to buy them new racks and shelves for their fire gear.** 



The Fairfield Volunteer Fire Department needs to replace their SCBA (Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus) gear, and it's expensive, to say the least. It's also important, though, as this gear protects the firefighters from smoke inhalation.

Many of our rural areas around Central Montana don't have good, if any, cell phone signal, and this can make it impossible for first responders to contact hospitals or others who can help. The Geraldine Community Ambulance team came up with a solution- They're going to mount a mobile Starlink dish on top of their ambulance, which will provide them with a high-speed internet connection no matter where they go.

Continuing with the theme of limited communications in rural areas, the Fort Benton Memorial Ambulance crew needed new portable radios to improve the reliability of their team's communications.

Mountain View donated \$16,000 to purchase these folks all new radios.

## Mountain View donated \$5,500 to make this project happen.



The Power Volunteer Fire Department applied for a grant to replace the rusty water tank on a water tender truck, as well as do some upgrades to other equipment. **We contributed \$10,000 to help get all this done.** 



The Ulm Volunteer Fire Department is building a massive addition onto their fire hall, but it won't be just more storage for trucks and equipment- This new addition will be a beautiful new training room / community meeting center where area residents and clubs can meet. **We contributed \$50,000 to help push this project across the finish line.** 



MSU-Northern is working on building a brand-new Ag Center. It will be built on the west end of Havre, and, when complete, will be a multi-purpose facility with an equestrian center and facilities for meetings and community events. **We contributed \$50,000 to help with phase one of this new construction.** Arleen Rice, our Havre area manager (left), presented our check to MSU-Northern Chancellor Greg Kegal and MSU-Northern Foundation Member Melanie Skoyen.

# **Digital Spreading**

With more computing power than the Apollo moon rockets, Mountain View's spreader trucks are out of this world. Here's what makes them special.

#### 1. StarFire™ GPS Receiver

This connects to GPS satellites that allow the spreader to know exactly where it is. And when we say exactly, we mean within **one inch** of accuracy. This enables autosteer, precision mapping, and more!

#### 2. Cell Signal Booster

Spreading fertilizer often takes our equipment to areas where cell signal is weak. This keeps it humming!

#### 3. Multiple Video Cameras

This machine has cameras so the operator can see the product flowing smoothly, ensuring that nothing is plugged up and that the system is delivering the perfect amount of fertilizer uniformly across the field.

#### **4. Giant Flotation Tires**


These massive tires provide great traction and let this 15+ ton machine gently float on top of the soil while working.

#### **5. Automatic Ladder**

The ladder automatically lowers when the vehicle is stopped, and raises when moving to stay out of harm's way.

#### 6. Nine Liter Diesel Engine

The huge engine can push this machine down the road at over 45 mph and is fed by a 155 gallon fuel tank.



## Hey, What Does This Button Do?

These massive machines look complicated, but are they? We spoke with Neal and Mark Lehnerz, 40+ year veterans of MVC spreading, to learn which buttons to press, and more importantly, which *not* to.

#### 1. On-Board Cameras

Multiple cameras are mounted inside the machine and let the operator see the fertilizer flowing smoothly.

#### 2. Connection to John Deere Operations Center

These icons show that the spreader is communicating with its satellites and is linked to the John Deere Operations Center. The machine can now receive maps, spreading instructions, and more all wirelessly through this system.

#### 3. Shift Track

These arrows will move the machine 12 inches left or right from the track the computer planned for the perfect spread.

#### 4. The Bird's Eye View

The blue parts of this map show what HAS been fertilized, and the gray parts show what HASN'T been done yet. The white line shows where the spreader has been, and where it's going. Remember, these machines drive themselves in the fields!

#### 5. Work!

When this button is on the machine is working and applying fertilizer.

#### **6. Section Control**

Occasionally, and especially on curvy fields, the spreader will have to drive over part of the field that it has already applied fertilizer to. Section control automatically shuts off the flow of fertilizer when it comes to these sections, and turns it back on when it's on fresh ground.

#### 7. AutoTrac

This button turns on the autosteering functionality.

#### 8. Operator Rehydration Unit

This portable 32 ounce fluid containment vessel is sold at most of Mountain View's retail stores, and ensures that the operator's thirst remains quenched for peak performance. Multiple flavor options available!

## **Baseball Opening Day Approaches**

The team at Centene Stadium is back at work getting their field and facilities ready for baseball season, and Mountain View is once again proud to help. Last Spring they completely replaced all of the turf in the ballpark, which hadn't been done in over 60 years, and was incredibly expensive. To protect this investment, **they called on Mountain View Co-op to do soil sampling.** But what does soil sampling mean, and what does it do?

**Soil sampling** is the process of extracting a small amount of dirt, usually about a pint, and sending it to a lab to be analyzed. The results tell us all about the soil: the pH, the levels of nitrogen, phosphorous, potassium, organic material, and more. Our agronomists can then recommend a fertilizer that will best promote plant health and growth. If you don't have a soil sample, picking a fertilizer is just a guess.

When the results came back for the ballpark our agronomists determined that the a blend of 25-10-10-5 with iron will work well and provide good results. Soil sampling certainly isn't necessary for every lawn, but if you're having trouble growing the thick, luxurious lawn you're hoping for it can provide the answers you need.
